WE ALL KNOW WHAT'S HAPPENING PREMIERED AT ARTS HOUSE, SUPPORTED BY CREATIVE VICTORIA AND SAVE THE CHILDREN.

Welcome to *We All Know What's Happening* by Samara Hersch and Lara Thoms, Vitalstatistix's first presentation for 2019.

When I saw this show at Campbelltown Arts Centre, NSW, late last year, I knew that Vitals had to present it and to do so as early as possible in 2019.

We All Know What's Happening is partly about the utterly bizarre history of Nauru and colonialism; however more broadly it reveals powerful truths about childhood, human rights, privilege and social change.

We present this show just as our Federal Parliament returns for its final sitting before a not too distant Federal election later this year. We can expect that the Member for Wentworth Kerryn Phelp's Urgent Medical Treatment Bill will be debated in the Lower House this week. Its passing will require the urgent medical transfer of any asylum seeker, child or adult, who is ill and unable to be treated offshore. Last week it was announced that the final four children currently held on Nauru will be resettled in the U.S with their families. The Australian Government has been dragged kicking and screaming to this outcome – and there is much still to do to change Australia's shameful treatment of asylum seekers and refugees, for which both major parties are responsible for.

As with the climate change emergency, in the last few years we have seen that it is children that are prepared to lead the radical, compassionate change needed in our society. This show powerfully represents that hope. Performed by seven children who collaborated with Lara and Samara to make this work - which won Best Production, Contemporary and Experimental Performance at the 2018 Green Room Awards - we hope it inspires activism in adults and children alike.

# From The Artists

From very early phosphate mining to current negotiations around refugee detention centres, our country has been literally placing itself in the middle of this tiny pacific island, adding to a long list of complex and absurd injustices.

# **WE ALL KNOW WHAT'S HAPPENING** IS A RESPONSE TO AUSTRALIA'S ONGOING COLONIAL RELATIONSHIP WITH NAURU.

Within the school system, Australian children have only recently begun to learn about Australia's own history of invasion and exploitation towards our First Nations People. This work hopes to extend the awareness of our country's questionable behaviour across the Pacific and our violation of basic human rights toward asylum seekers.

This work premieres more than four years since the Australian government announced that "Asylum seekers who come here by boat without a visa will never be settled in Australia." With the recent sudden removal of all doctors from the island and the outbreak of traumatic withdrawal syndromes experienced by refugee children there, there is no doubt that pressure is intensifying on the government to stop this cruelty. Whilst some children are now in Australia seeking treatment, we, like many others, want to keep this conversation on the table and end this unnecessary cycle of trauma and uncertainty that is happening in our name.

Although we often feel the need to protect children from atrocities performed by our country there is a particular tension when this involves other children their own age. Throughout this process we have worked with seven incredible young people who are thoughtful, political and deeply concerned, some of whom have even created their own organisation dedicated to children's rights called Children for Children.

Whilst We All Know What's Happening plays with traditional and sometimes satirical forms such as the musical and school history lesson, the politics of this work are intentionally palpable. What we didn't expect was that the despair we felt at the beginning of our process has shifted to inspiration as we witness young people dedicated to changing Australia's policies and seeing children their age find justice.
